## A perfect example of the man with 'go' in him

THE Duke of Edinburgh breezed through Leeds last night in four hours of keen questioning of the youth of the city. He wanted to know what progress was being made in his Award

Scheme, which is designed to toughen teenage boys morally

toughen teenage boys morally and physically and give them a bit of "go."

He found out what progress was being made... and the boys found out that the Duke was a perfect example of the man with "go."

From the time his helicopter landed on Woodhouse Moor (with himself at the outhrolls to the time he left leeds by train 20 minutes after the scheduled time, the Duke let not question go unasked and nothing of interest go unnoticed.

## 'Wrinkle' on rigging

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His first call was on the Boys' Brigade at Burley Methodist Church, Cardigan Lane. Life Boys formed one guard of honour and boys from the Leeds companies a second.

The Duke showed that he either makes model ships or someone has shown him how. Mr. G. Dickinson, an instructor with the 20th Company, was showing boys how model galleons are made. The Duke asked whether the plans gave a "wrinkle" on how to make the rigging.

The plan didn't, "Well," said the Duke, "you take your cotton, weight it at the bottom, give it well and hang it up. When the give is dry the cotton becomes rigid. You can then cut it up into lengths and stack it on the ship."

The Duke dined in the Food Technology Department of the College of Technology. (The menu: Melon,
